BALLOT INFORMATION

There will be two questions on the April 2, 2019 ballot concerning the Odessa Fire & Rescue Protection District of Lafayette County, Missouri:

Question 1 – If approved, will authorize the Fire District to provide Emergency Ambulance Service with a tax levy of not more than \$0.30 per one hundred dollars assessed valuation. The Fire District currently does not provide ambulance service – Emergency Ambulance Services are provided by the City of Odessa and funded through the General Fund.

Question 2 - If approved, will allow the Fire District to expand to a 24-hour service with a tax levy of not more than \$0.15 per one hundred dollars assessed valuation.

A yes vote on both questions means an additional levy of \$0.45 per one hundred dollars of assessed valuation.

What does the assessment mean to your property tax bill? For a property appraised at \$150,000.00, the 45 cents per 100 dollars assessed would mean an additional \$128.25 to your property tax bill.

Can the City of Odessa assess a levy outside of the City limits? No, the City does not have the ability to assess a levy to any parcel/resident outside of the City limits or in Lake Lafayette. The only way for everyone to pay their portion is through a merger to One Odessa Fire & EMS District where the Fire District can then assess the levy to be equally supported by residents both inside and outside of the city limits.

If approved, what would be the total levy for the One Odessa Fire & EMS District (Odessa Fire & Rescue Protection District)? If the additional .45 is approved, the total levy would be \$0.92

If approved, how would the total levy for the One Odessa Fire & EMS

CURRENT STATUS Odessa Fire & Rescue Protection District &

- The City of Odessa's Emergency Medical Services (EMS) and The Fire District operate separately.
- Properties in the Fire District are assessed at \$0.47 per one hundred dollars of assessed valuation for Fire Services, THERE IS NO ASSESSMENT FOR EMS SERVICES.
- EMS is a full-time 24-hour service, the Fire District is not. If both questions are passed, then both EMS and Fire District would be 24-hour service, decreasing the response time.
- # 40% of ambulance calls are outside of the city limits.
- Fire District residents outside of the City limits do not pay for any EMS operational services since they do not pay City taxes. They only pay if they use the ambulance service.
- 100% of EMS operating budget is paid through the city's general fund and only partially reimbursed by the rural residents who use Emergency Services.
- Second out EMS calls (calls for Emergency Services when another emergency is already underway) go to outside agencies, increasing response time and costing the community dollars.
- EMS equipment and technology needs upgrading. Without dedicated dollars for EMS the money comes out of the general fund taking away important dollars for streets, police and other services.



If Voters Decide VES on ONE ODESSA
