



Governing Structure

Odessa is governed by a mayor and board of aldermen. Aldermen are elected in April to two-year terms. Odessa's three wards each have two aldermen. The mayor also is elected to a two-year term.

Decisions in the city are made by a simple-majority vote on behalf of the aldermen. In event of a tie, the mayor is able to cast a vote.

City Commonly asked codes questions

The city of Odessa has many codes, enforced by police and codes enforcement officer, Sybille Wilson. City staff provided the following list of answers to common questions from residents.

What is the maximum height grass/weeds can be before it is in violation? Grass and weeds are in violation if exceeding ten (10) inches (2006 IPMC302.4)

What am I responsible to mow? In addition to the lawn, you are responsible to mow all rights of way and easements included on your property, everything up to the street and everything back to the alleys.

What is considered an inoperable vehicle? Any vehicle not currently licensed, or that has issues that cause it to be illegal to be driven on the street.

Where may I park my vehicle? Vehicles are required to be parked on a paved surface. No vehicle may block any public sidewalk, extend into the street, or be parked on the grass. (OCDC 8.406)

May I add a gravel driveway? If the original driveway was gravel and legally permitted at the time of installation, it would be legal. You may keep it provided you maintain it. However, you may not increase the size. New gravel driveways are not allowed. (OCDC 8.406)

May I burn yard waste? Yes, ONLY yard waste may be burned (limbs, sticks, branches, etc). You must notify the Odessa Fire & Rescue Department first. You shall not burn on windy days, or if a burn ban is in place. Brush piles must be removed or properly disposed of.

Do I need a permit to install a fence? A permit is required for any fence that is over three & one half (3 1/2) feet. Any fence over 3 1/2 feet shall not encroach into a required front yard setback. Fences may extend onto side yard setbacks on corner lots, provided that they set back from the right-of-way line at least eight (8) feet. (OCDC 8.309.1)

Do I need a permit for a detached accessory building? If the building is more than one hundred twenty (120) square feet, a permit is required. (2006 IRC 105.2)

How big may I build my accessory building? Main and accessory buildings shall not cover more than twenty-five percent (25%) of the total lot area on interior lots and thirty percent (30%) on corner lots. Accessory buildings shall not cover more than twenty percent (20%) of the rear yard. (OCDC 8.309)

Do I need a permit for building a deck? If the deck is going to be over thirty (30) inches above grade, a permit will be required. (2006 IRC 312.1)

Do I need a permit for a swimming pool? Any swimming pool with a depth of twenty-four (24) inches requires a permit. Pools, hot tubs and spas containing water more than twenty-four (24) inches in depth, shall be completely surrounded by a fence or barrier at least forty-eight (48) inches in height. (2006 IPMC 303.2)

How many layers of roofing material may I put on my house? The maximum allowable number of layers of roofing is two (2). (2006 IRC 907.3) The City of Odessa does require an ice shield to extend from the lowest edges of all roof surfaces to a point at least twenty-four (24) inches inside the exterior wall line of the building. (OCDC 7.201)

How many pets may I have? The maximum number is three (3). A kennel license is required for more than that. Operating a kennel is not allowed in a residential district.

What work do I need a permit for? If you have this question for a particular project, please call the Code Compliance Department and ask. Most minor projects do not need a permit.

City staff also advises:

- Always call DIG-RITE before beginning any excavation project.
- Residential trash containers should be placed at the curb not more than 24 hours prior to scheduled collection and stored at the side or rear of property after pick-up.
- Garage and yard sale signs shall not be placed on public utility/light poles.
- Street address numbers must be in contrast with background, must be Arabic numerals at least 4 inches high and be visible from street.

Severe weather



The Community of Christ, 515 S. First Street, is the city's designated storm shelter.

Severe weather sirens in Odessa are usually tested for three minutes at 11 a.m. on the first Wednesday of the month.

If the sirens sound, residents should go inside and seek information from sources including local television and radio stations as well as the internet and National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration All-Hazards radios. Residents can also sign up for local alerts through the city website, cityofodessamo.com.

Odessa does not use an "all clear" signal, so any repeat soundings of the siren mean the emergency is continuing. Sirens may sound for three to five minutes at a time in an emergency. Sirens are not intended to permeate the insulation of modern houses, instead intending to warn residents outside.

In addition to tornado warnings, which is when a tornado has been spotted or indicated by radar, the sirens can be sounded in the event of a severe thunderstorm warning in which wind is expected to reach 70 miles per hour or create hail two inches in diameter or any emergency in which immediate action needs to be taken.

Tornado watches mean weather conditions can result in storms which produce heavy rain, lightning, strong wind, large hail or tornadoes. In case of a warning, shelter should be taken in small interior rooms on the lowest floor available. In such cases, mobile homes should be vacated.

The Community of Christ, 515 S. First Street, Odessa, is the city's designated shelter in case of severe weather.

Any and all pets accompanying people seeking shelter must be in a kennel/cage. Those seeking shelter must stay in the designated shelter area. Smoking is not allowed in the church or on church property. The church and representatives of the church are not responsible for lost, stolen or damaged items. Those seeking shelter are asked to remain in the church until the storm has passed. The church will not be responsible for anyone who chooses to leave before a severe weather event has ended.

Josh Thompson, police chief, is director of the Odessa Emergency Management Agency. The agency is tasked with preparing the city for disasters including tornadoes.

Fire Odessa Fire & Rescue Protection District



In January 2020 the Odessa Fire and Rescue Protection District became the area's EMS service provider.

Odessa Fire and Rescue Protection District was organized in 1993, after years of service as a City of Odessa and Rural Fire Association. In 2020, the district will undergo the largest change since its founding with the addition of ambulance service and all-hours staffing.

The District operates under a publicly elected Board of Directors. Derek Downs serves as board chairman. Marty McDermed is board secretary, and Grant Kuhlmann is board treasurer of the five-member board which also includes Ruth Ann Dillon and Gary Johnson as directors. The directors of the district hold a regularly scheduled monthly meeting the third Wednesday of each month.

In April 2019, residents of the district voted for additional taxes for the district to provide ambulance service in the area, which was previously provided by the City of Odessa.

With the addition of EMS in 2020, district hours began to offer 24-hour in-house staffing. Non-emergency telephone line is in operation from 8 a.m.-5 p.m.

Firefighter staff includes full and part-time employees and volunteers.

The district's six-bay fire station at the corner of Dryden and Third streets was dedicated in 1995.

Insurance rating for the City of Odessa or any property within five miles of the Odessa station or within five miles of any of its automatic aid stations is "5". Properties not within five miles of any station may have a higher ISO rating.

The District, which covers 101 square miles, has made many improvements since 1895, when the first department

used a team of horses owned by G.B. Thatcher to pull the ladder wagon.

District equipment includes a 2019 ambulance, 2003 engine, 2000 engine, 1993 75-foot ladder truck, 2006 tanker and 2017 tanker. The District also has three brush trucks, the newest purchased in 2016, and one utility truck in its fleet, as well as a secondary ambulance acquired in the service transition from the City of Odessa. Through the years, miscellaneous equipment, firefighter turnout gear and rescue equipment upgrades also have been purchased.

District has seven full-time employees around 25 employees. All full-time and most part-time employees are certified in both fire and EMS.

As of July, Roger Kratz and Kim Shook serve as district co-interim chiefs. Captains are Matt Couch, Josh Sidebottom and Travis Hopkins.





Legend



Schools Odessa R-VII

Odessa R-VII Board of Education

Odessa R-VII School district is located in western Lafayette County and includes a portion of northern Johnson County. The district is approximately 25 miles east of Kansas City.

The district has consistently earned over 90% of total points possible on the state's annual performance report.

The Odessa R-VII District operates under a \$4.6932 tax levy.

Student population for the district currently totals 2018 in grades K-12.

The district employs approximately 259 persons including classified staff.

Odessa R-VII offers many programs and its students excel in state and national academic competitiveness. Odessa R-VII students traditionally receive high honors in such organizations as DECA, FBLA, FCCLA, FFA, FEA, Math Relay Team, drama, speech and debate, band and vocal music. Both the FFA and engineering instructors have received honors and recognition in the work they do with students. Other outstanding programs offered by the district include Drug-Free World, special education, breakfast, all-day kindergarten, infant care for teen students and patrons, Peer Helpers, Hi-Step, SOAR before and after school child care, Parents as Teachers, gifted, at-risk, entitlement, summer school, computer labs, vocational Lex La-Ray Vo-Tech School in Lexington with job training courses, student athletic activities, before and after school tutoring and numerous organizations/clubs. Integrated technology is an important element in the Odessa R-VII curriculum with students frequently using computers and various media to problem solve, research and create project-based products.

Students who reside more than one mile from their attending school may be transported by bus to the appropriate facility. One-mile requirement does not apply to Grade 5 and younger.

The ACE program offers alternative classes for students struggling in a regular classroom setting.

Parents support the schools through active parent/teacher organizations. PTO at the elementary level and STEP at the middle school give volunteer support and host fundraising activities.

More than 50% of the teaching staff in the district hold master's degree along with an average of more than 10 years longevity. The R-VII School District remains competitive with the surrounding area regarding base salary. This is the benchmark of most school districts and Odessa has managed to keep pace with an experienced staff. According to the state funding mechanism, the district strives to maintain a salary schedule comparable to those districts of similar size, as well.

Base salary for beginning teachers in the 2020-21 school year is \$36,200.

Academically, Odessa offers students a range of choices from computer labs in each R-VII school to a physics requirement for each high school student with four levels of study offered.

Odessa's athletic program offers football, basketball, track, tennis, golf, cross country, soccer, volleyball, wrestling, softball, baseball and cheerleading.

In addition to an excellent sports program and other traditional clubs and academic organizations, Odessa has an outstanding fine arts program.

The district continues to provide diverse opportunities to ensure a variety of experiences and opportunities for the students.

According to performance data from state testing, Odessa R-VII surpassed Missouri standards set by the state in mathematics and communication arts. Almost all students realized gains in achievement scores compared to the previous year. ACT scores continue to improve, as well.

In April 2017, Odessa R-VII voters overwhelmingly passed a \$6 million no-tax-increase bond issue, which allowed the district to renovate the

stadium located on the high school campus during the summer of 2017. In addition, the bond issue included a new facility construction of a district Childcare Center, located on the McQuerry Elementary campus, which opened in August 2018.

Security cameras have been placed in all schools and on all buses to strengthen the district's safety program.

Dr. Jon Oetinger, superintendent, stresses the district has good cooperation with the local police department. The Drug Free program is part of the curriculum for sixth-graders at the middle school. A School Resource Officer is on site.

The public health and safety department in Odessa assists the school district. The county health department holds annual immunization clinics. The fire department is involved in bicycle and fire safety along with inspection of buildings and fire extinguishers, and insurance inspection reports.



Recreation Parks & Rec

Odessa Parks and Recreation Department offers a wide variety of recreational activities and facilities for local residents. Employees include a full-time director and maintenance director as well as seasonal workers, as needed, throughout the year.

The department is funded by a 1/2¢ park sales tax and a 14¢ per \$100 assessed valuation on Odessa residents' real estate and personal property.

Lindsey Adams, director, oversees the development and maintenance of the department's parks and facilities.

Joey Starner, maintenance supervisor, performs mowing, trimming and maintenance work on the department's parks and facilities.

Formed in June 1997, the Parks and Recreation Department offers programs and activities throughout the year. Available to children from four years old through seventh grade are basketball, baseball, softball, machine pitch baseball and softball, t-ball, co-ed soccer and girls volleyball for grades 4-7.

Special youth events organized by the department are Knights of Columbus free throw competition in January and Challenger British soccer camp in August.

Youth programs offered by the department include karate, taught by **Alan Best**.

Adult activities offered to area residents include co-ed church league slow-pitch softball in the summer and men's slow-pitch and co-ed adult softball in the fall.

Aquatic Center activities available are swimming lessons for age 4-Adults. Pool parties at rental rates are offered as well.

Pool hours are 1-6 p.m., Saturday-Thursday and 1-7 p.m., Friday.

The department also offers five parks, a community center, rodeo arena, basketball courts, three paved walking trails and shelter houses for the community's recreational use.

Volunteers are a big part of the recreation side of the Parks and Recreation Department.

Lake Odessa, the former city reservoir, is located southwest of Odessa city limits on Odessa Lake Road off of Eds Road from Hwy. 00. Lake is owned by the City of Odessa and managed for its fishery resource by the Missouri Department of Conservation. This partnership was created as a way to provide the residents of Odessa and the surrounding communities with a quality fishery to enjoy.


To fish at Lake Odessa, anglers need a state fishing permit as well as a City of Odessa user permit which may be purchased at City Hall and the Police Department.

There is a protected slot limit for black bass in the lake which means that all fish between 12 and 15 inches must be immediately returned to the water unharmed.

The use of any motorboat is allowed but boats must be operated at slow, no-wake speeds. Firearms are prohibited on the premises and hunting is not allowed.

Lake Venita, located in Dyer Park, also is a hot spot for local fishing. A state fishing license is required. Row-boats are allowed as well as boats with trolling motors, however, boats are not necessary to fish the lake.

Users are asked to help preserve the quality of the lakes and report any wildlife violations to the Department of Conservation by calling Operation Game Thief hotline 800-392-1111 and any other violations by calling the Odessa City Police Department.

The Odessa branch of Trails Regional Library moved into a beautiful new facility in 2016 thanks, in part, to generous donations from the community. Located at 107 W. Mason Street, the library is approximately 7,000 square feet with an open floor plan and includes a community meeting room, storytime room and several computers accessible to the public, in addition to its sizable collection of print and audiovisual materials.

Regular library hours are Tuesday-Friday 9 a.m. - 6 p.m. and Saturday 9 a.m. - 1 p.m. COVID-19 curbside hours are Monday, Wednesday-Friday, 10 a.m. - 3 p.m. and Tuesday, 2 - 7 p.m.

Friendly staff includes Linda Washam, branch manager, Kendra Redden, Amy Harris, Pamela Gladbach and Pamela Barker.

In August 2017, the library joined the Missouri Evergreen consortium, allowing users the ability to access titles from 40 library districts across the state. A full catalog of materials is accessible by visiting the library's website, www.trailslibrary.org. Users are able to search for books and other materials, place requests, verify which items they have checked out and renew materials. Books and other materials are often delivered to the Odessa branch in days. In addition to the physical collection, the library offers a digital collection, accessible via the library's website, such as downloadable eBooks and audiobooks through OverDrive or hoopla, or reference databases offered through Ebsco.

The library has programs year-round for all ages, from storytime and other early learning programs to adult book clubs and escape rooms. Program information also may be found online.

The library also is a good source for genealogy research, offering local history, a large file of local obituaries and microfilm copies of local newspapers dating from 1901 to 2014. Detailed information from U.S. Census reports from 1830 to the latest printed census also are available for those conducting research. Online resources, such as Ancestry Online and HeritageQuest, also are available to cardholders. Trails Regional Library Foundation provides patrons the opportunity to support the library. Foundation activities

promote the branch within the community and raise funds for library needs. To become involved with the Foundation, call the library at 816-633-4089.

The Odessian began in 1884 as *The Odessa Moon*. Renamed the *Odessa Democrat* by publisher A.J. Adair, who purchased the newspaper in 1906, the paper was sold in 1940 to the Collins Ewing family, owners of *The Missouri Ledger*. The two papers were merged into what is now *The Odessian*.

The Ewings sold the newspaper in 1947 to William A. Bray. Remaining the publisher until 1954, Bray left to become executive director of the Missouri Press Association and sold the paper to Joe Western. Western was publisher from 1954 to 1960, until moving to Washington, D.C., to join the staff of *The Wall Street Journal*.

Betty Simpson Spaar purchased the newspaper on December 1, 1960, and remained actively involved in reporting the news and assisting businesses with advertising needs until her death in 2018. The newspaper is now published by her sons, John and Joe Spaar. The Simpson/Spaar family has worked in the newspaper profession for five generations beginning with Betty's grandfather who published the newspaper in Rolla. For many years, her parents, Mr. and Mrs. W. L. Simpson, owned and operated the *Holden Progress*. The Spaar family has deep roots in the community of Odessa and continues to chronicle it and the area's history. Currently, two generations of the family have been raised in Odessa and work at *The Odessian*.

Joe Spaar, co-publisher and production manager, is a past board member of the Missouri Press Association. He is treasurer and past president of the Odessa Parks and Recreation Board. He won a first place award in the state for his weekly column, Sports Time Out.

John Spaar, co-publisher and advertising manager, was the 2005 president of the Missouri Press Association, the third generation of his family to hold that office. He has served as president of the Odessa Chamber of Commerce. He also is a member and past president of the Odessa Rotary Club.

Renee Spaar, who handles the Newspapers in Education program for the Odessa and Wellington-Napoleon school districts, received a Missouri Press Association award for best NIE program. She delivers *The Odessian* each Thursday

morning to fifth grade classrooms at the Odessa Upper Elementary School and Wellington-Napoleon Elementary School. In addition to NIE duties, Renee, wife of Joe Spaar, is office manager.

Hannah Spaar, daughter of Joe and Renee Spaar, is news editor. A 2009 graduate of Odessa High School and a 2013 graduate of the University of Missouri, Columbia, Missouri School of Journalism, Hannah has written a weekly column in *The Odessian* since she was 10 years old. She has received numerous awards for reporting, editorial writing and photography and was named the Missouri Press Association's 2016 Outstanding Young Journalist. She also serves as news editor for *Focus on Oak Grove*. She is currently on the board of the Missouri Press Association.

Linda Gillis, production, compiles and writes the Yesteryears column. She also researches and writes historical features and compiles information on the local men and women who serve in the military.

Ruth Beamer reports on Bates City and Wellington city governments.

Kory Hales, sports editor and photographer, Pam Schuchner, production and Marty Beamer, circulation, round out the staff.

In an effort to better serve area businesses, employees continually strive to create effective advertising. *The Odessian* staff has received numerous advertising awards, among them a national grand prize for the annual Christmas section.

The office is located at 212 West Mason Street. The building is handicapped accessible and features ample parking for customers.





Community History

The city of Odessa, platted on September 17, 1878, by Judge John Kirkpatrick, Sara Kirkpatrick and Alexander R. Patterson, was built on the north side of the Chicago & Alton railroad tracks, 39 miles east of Kansas City. The city was incorporated on February 3, 1880.

Residents of Odessa preferred naming the town Kirkpatrick, after Judge Kirkpatrick, the largest landowner in the community but Kirkpatrick, according to historical accounts, did not want the town named after him. T.B. Blackstone, president of Chicago & Alton Railroad, while visiting, told residents the land reminded him of the wheat belt in the great exporting community of Odessa, Ukraine. Originally a village of 100 people, Odessa approved fourth class city status during an 1884 election.

In 1878, the first locomotive came through Odessa, followed by many new settlers. Families were moving to the area on a daily basis.

Many of the early structures, originally built at Mt. Hope southeast of Odessa, were moved to Odessa. During the Civil War, the Bowlan Hotel, which was at the northeast corner of Second and Main streets, relocated at a cost of \$500, was occupied by a group of federal soldiers in Co. 1, 1st Cavalry, Missouri State Militia, under the leadership of Captain Milton Burris.

Another historical building, the original Presbyterian church, was razed in 2003 and the property in downtown Odessa is now the site of NASB.

Other well-known structures in Odessa included the Myrtle Hotel, on the southeast corner of Second and Main streets, built in 1883, where William Jennings Bryan sometimes stayed.

The Phoenix Opera House, built in the 1880s by Alexander Patterson, sat on the northwest corner of Second and Mason. The hotel burned in 1884 in the first big fire in Odessa and was rebuilt on an even grander scale. The Phoenix Opera House eventually burned on July 22, 1913.

By June of 1879, communities on the north and south side of

the railroad tracks were competing for the business district. The competition continued until the construction of a post office at the corner of Second and Mason streets.

"The old public well," in the middle of the street at Second and Mason, provided water, since a water system was not in place until September, 1922.

A water plant, approved and built in 1922, and electricity made available in 1899, all contributed to Odessa's continued growth.

Another point of historical interest was the Ozark Short Line, a scenic route from Leon, Ia., to the Pea Ridge Battlefield in Arkansas. Traveled frequently in the 1920s and 1930s, travelers crossed the Missouri River at Lexington and followed markers through Wellington to Odessa.

During that time, Lake Venita in Odessa was a spot not only for travelers, but locals, as well. The 23-acre lake contained 61,000,000 gallons of water, and was known in 1908 as Mulvill Park. The facility provided entertainment, boating, bathhouses, a sand beach, tourist cottages, dining and dancing.

In 1997, the dam broke and the lake was drained.

Lake Venita was restored with the assistance of a \$144,000 grant from the Landmark Local Parks Program, through the Department of Natural Resources, and assistance from the city of Odessa. The restoration of the lake was commemorated at a dedication ceremony on July 4, 2004. Dam broke again July 18, 2009. The dam has been repaired and the lake bed has been filled with water.

Odessa, according to the 2010 census, is the largest city in Lafayette County with 5300 residents.

Odessa also boasts the largest population increase of any city in Lafayette County. In 1970, the official census recorded 2839 residents. The 1980 census figures reported 3088. In 1990, population had grown to 3685 and in 2000, the population was 4818.

That percentage of growth surpassed all the cities in the county.

Community Church History

Many of the oldest churches in the Odessa area were chartered more than 100 years ago. The Presbyterian, First Baptist, First Christian, St. George Catholic, United Methodist and Church of Christ are six of the oldest churches in the community. Some of these churches have had at least six generations of family members in attendance.



First Baptist Church, 100 W. OO Highway, was first organized in 1874 as Mt. Hope Baptist Church. In 1879, the branch moved to the year-old city of Odessa. Until the frame church building could be completed, services were held in Gibbs Hall, which was across from today's City Hall.

Completed in 1878 for \$1450, the building became the first official church home for the congregation. The original church was on Dryden Street, across from the present First Christian Church. The building was damaged in an 1886 tornado.

In November 1924, a new church was built at First and Mason with 22 members. It later included an educational building, added to the west of the structure in 1956 and an additional annex completed in 1976. Due to membership growth and the need for a larger facility, the congregation sold that structure and moved in August 2007 into a new church building on property at the southwest corner of the intersection of Highway 131 and Route OO. The building contains classrooms, offices, kitchen and nursery facilities and a large sanctuary. The church completed the addition of The Refuge, a social, youth and event space.



The **First United Methodist Church, 301 S. First Street**, organized in 1880, constructed its first church building in 1882 and an additional structure in 1896. Both were destroyed by fire in 1903. A new building was built and ready for occupancy by October 17, 1904. Since that time, the church has added a sanctuary, educational building, classrooms and basement, and remodeled the original part of the building. Damaged in the 2016 tornado, it has been repaired and a ramp installed in the rear for handicapped members.



First Christian Church, 224 W. Dryden, congregation met for the first time in 1879 when the Greenton and Mt. Hope congregations blended into the Odessa congregation after the towns moved nearer the railroad. In 1880, a building was constructed from materials removed from the Greenton church, which dated back to 1850. That building was destroyed in the 1886 tornado and was replaced by a frame building which later burned. A third church, built in 1893, was placed on the same site and was dedicated on November 21, 1926. An addition to the church, which includes an elevator, was dedicated in 1995.



St. George Catholic Church, 716 S. Third Street, dates back to 1888. Early church records were destroyed in a fire at the Higinville Catholic Church. In 1888, the first church building was near the present-day 1912 Public School building. It burned a year later. In 1890, the church relocated to the southeast corner of Second and Dryden streets. The congregation remained in the building until August 1964, when that building was demolished and a church was built at Third and Phillips across from Odessa High School.

Begun as a mission, the church received its first residential pastor, the Rev. James Hardy, in 1977. The church constructed a parish hall on the lot next to the church in 1978. A home for the priest was purchased in 1983 on Third Street, south of the church.

A new building was dedicated in April 2005 adjacent to the former church, which now serves as a meeting hall.

Community Church History



Odessa Church of Christ, Fourth Street and Otway, celebrated its 100th anniversary at this location in July, 1992. After meeting in different locations, the church's first building was destroyed in 1886 by a tornado. Another building, erected on the same foundation, burned. The next building was constructed in 1893 on land purchased for \$100 from the John Kirkpatrick Sr. family. The interior of that building was damaged in 1963 by a fire of unknown origin. The building has since been torn down to make way for a new gymnasium. The new sanctuary adjacent to the original structure was completed and dedicated in 1999. An additional fellowship hall/gymnasium opened in July, 2019.

In 1905, Odessa also was the site of the **Western Bible and Literary College**, run by the church and housed in buildings which had been abandoned by an unsuccessful college. The dormitory still exists as two homes on South First Street and a third home southeast of Odessa on Varner Road.



New Horizon Presbyterian Church USA, 4266 S. 131 Highway, organized January 27, 1883, as the First Presbyterian Church of Odessa, was the first church to open in Odessa and stay at its original location until a new building opened for services on July 14, 2002.

Church sits south of Odessa on 131 Highway on land donated by the B.B. Barr family. Name was changed prior to the move to the new location.

The first building, destroyed in the May 11, 1886 tornado, had to be rebuilt. Eleven years later, in 1897, the building was dismantled and rebuilt after faulty workmanship and material were discovered. That building burned January 29, 1900, and the records were destroyed. Finally, for the fourth time, the building, constructed in 1900-01, was completed on the original site and was in use until it was razed upon completion of the new church building. Site, on the northeast corner of Second and Dryden streets, is now the home of NASB.



Calvary Baptist Church, I-70 and 131 Highway, was formed in 1978 when 100 members of the First Baptist Church left to create a new church, which sits atop a hill on I-70 overlooking the city of Odessa. Church celebrated its 40-year anniversary in 2018. A new sanctuary was completed in 2003.



Odessa Restoration Branch, 131 Highway North, organized when members broke off from the Odessa Reorganized Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints in September of 1989. Congregation met temporarily at the Odessa Truck Sales facility on I-70 until a new structure was built on Highway 131, one-fourth mile north of I-70. The first service was held there December 5, 1992.



The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, 300 E. Crestview, was formed in 1979, meeting in a small facility on North Fourth Street for five years until 5.25 acres at the east end of Crestview Drive was purchased and a meetinghouse was built.

Meetinghouse was rededicated in 2005 after a nine-month renovation which extended the north face of the building. Addition included a choir rostrum, additional classrooms, library, larger foyers, plumbing and HVAC.

In 2006, the meetinghouse was expanded again to the south, providing larger auxiliary instruction rooms. Today the meetinghouse provides approximately 15,000 square feet of worship and instruction space.

Community Church History



Community of Christ, 515 S. First Street, the former **Reorganized Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints**, purchased the present church site in 1948, where the Western Literary and Bible College once stood. They also purchased materials from the Mt. Zion Methodist Church building, near Chapel Hill. The congregation used the authentic Chapel Hill church pews until new pews could be obtained. Those pews were then used in the Bates City RLDS Church until other pews were purchased.

Woods Chapel United Methodist Church, eight miles south of Odessa on 131 Highway, was built in 1884 and remodeled in 1984. The church burned to the ground October 10, 2019. It is being rebuilt at the same location and should be ready to reopen sometime in 2020.

Cedar Grove Christian Church is located south on 131, then east on Route U to County Road 370, and south on gravel road 1 1/2 miles. The church was organized in 1883.


Crown Christian Center, organized in 1996, meets at 7 p.m. each Sunday at 7411 Outer Road, the former Countryside Family Dining Restaurant building.

Rolling Meadows Christian Church constructed a new building on Odessa Cemetery Road. The congregation formerly was known as Community Christian Church.

New Hope Baptist Church, 110 S. First St.; Pastor Tyrone Thirfield; Evangelist, Wilbur Conway. Church holds Sunday School at 9 a.m. and Sunday worship at 10:30 a.m.



Life Point Church, the former First Assembly of God, was organized in 1964. In 1979, the present structure was built on a triangular lot on 131 Highway, Phillips and First streets. Church members have completed a sanctuary which seats 400 persons adjacent to the present building, which was converted to an education wing.

The Odessa Cemetery is located east of town on Odessa Cemetery Road. An association was formed in 1943.

Before the two communities, Greenton and Mt. Hope, moved nearer to the C&A Railroad forming the town of Odessa, people buried their loved ones, or perhaps complete strangers, in family or church cemeteries. On September 26, 1881, land purchased from Asa Hatch became the Odessa Cemetery, shortly before the town of Odessa was incorporated.

The first person buried in the cemetery was a one-year-old child named Robbie, by his parents Mr. and Mrs. P.W. Gum, on October 16, 1881. Families who had buried loved ones in family graveyards or in rural areas, primarily from the Greenton and Mt. Hope areas, moved family members to the Odessa Cemetery. Some of these reburials covered deaths as far back as 1847.

In 1943, Mayor Thomas Dyer recommended maintenance of the Odessa Cemetery be turned over to a citizen board.

Hugh Ramsey, present at the first board meeting, suggested an endowment fund be established in order to properly restore and manage the cemetery. Ramsey reviewed plans in other cities, worked on cemetery records, and developed bylaws to manage the cemetery. Located at the Odessa Cemetery is a monument placed there by the Odessa Cemetery Association, Inc. in memory of Ramsey's contributions.

Officers are Denny Fieth, president; Joe Parshall, vice president; Martha Dahlor, secretary; Amanda Hotmer, treasurer. Other members are John Hotmer, Dennis Slusher, Robert Dannner, Joey Kleoppel, Sherryl Delana, Paul Robbins, Bruce Whitsitt and Phil Varner. Board meets at 7 p.m. the first Tuesday of the month at the cemetery office, 202 W. Mason. To purchase lots, contact Larry or Tyra Greenfield, 633-8264 or 263-1994.

Greenton Cemetery, established in 1835 north of Odessa, is the oldest cemetery in the area. The church is the last building left from the town of Greenton. The land, donated by Joseph H. Green, contains one of the earliest recorded headstones, that of a child, Harriet V., the infant daughter of M.M. and M.J. Robinson, dated 1849.

Harvey Geary is the current president of the Greenton Cemetery Association board. Gary and Joyce Kite are co-secretary-treasurers and board members are Ronnie Gray, Glenn Barker, Bill Schieber and Larry Jones.

Mt. Tabor Cemetery originated in 1893 when a tract of land was donated southeast of Odessa on what is now Mt. Tabor Road by John and Nancy McNeel.

The cemetery is made up of the original tract, plus an area donated by Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Steelman Jr., and a five-acre tract purchased in 1989 from the Steelmans.

Present corporation board members are Jerry Wade, president; Ronnie Steelman, vice president; Laura Nolte, secretary; Frances Laun, treasurer; Roger Douthit and Arthur Steelman Jr.

Greenton Cemetery, established in 1835, is one of the oldest cemeteries in the area. The cemetery adjoins Greenton Baptist Church.

Woods Chapel Cemetery is south of Odessa on 131 Highway in Johnson County. The cemetery, which is east of the church, was incorporated May 2, 1944. The oldest tombstones date back to those of Civil War veterans.

Woods Chapel Cemetery Association board president is Donald Pemberton. Leland McNeel is vice president and Wilma McNeel is secretary/treasurer. Board members are Penny Sisk and Jerry Long.

The association is governed by a board which manages the money, ascertains where new graves can be placed, charges for plots, pays for maintenance and keeps the records.

The Bates City Cemetery was opened in 1891 when the community's founder, Theodore Bates, died. His widow purchased five acres of land from her son and selected a family plot in the center before deeding the remainder to the churches of Bates City as their cemetery.

In later years, the south side of the cemetery was used for burials but today the original land has been modified with burial lots and driveways. Cemetery added a brick entryway and repaired the iron fence around the Bates family plot in 2010.

Current board members are Don Reynolds, president; Gayle Bainbridge, secretary; Jim Bainbridge, treasurer; Ruth Ford, Bob Bainbridge and Bill Bainbridge.

Rural cemeteries are either family or church graveyards. Two graveyards, Muir and a portion of Mt. Hebron, were reserved for black families. The Summers-Helm and Powell cemeteries each have a cenotaph in memory of men who died in the Revolutionary War. The first was placed at Summers-Helm for Ezekial Stewart (1741-1837) by his son, David Stewart. The other, thought to be a memorial stone as it was placed after the 1974 survey, is for Joseph Powell (1760-1835).

A collection and work documenting area cemeteries has been compiled and published by Marty Helm Brunetti, Odessa. The transcription may be accessed at the Odessa branch of Trails Regional Library in the genealogy section.

The oldest grave site recorded in the history books, Brunetti said, is at the Thomas Hopper Cemetery. The son of Thomas Hopper died May 31, 1924, around the age of 26 leaving a wife and two small sons. Cemetery is a short distance from Junction 131 and FF, northeast, between Odessa and Wellington.

Other rural cemeteries include Barker, Campbell, Chapel Hill, Cobb, Concord Baptist, McKendree Chapel, Mt. Hope, Pleasant Prairie, Poole, Old Concord Baptist, Shore, Summers-Helm, Odessa; Marvin Chapel, Mayview, Mound Prairie, Zion United Church of Christ, Mayview; Anderson, Napoleon United Methodist, St. Paul, Napoleon; Arnold, Mt. Olivet, St. Luke Evangelical, Wellington City Cemetery, Wellington.

Historical Society

Odessa Area Historical Society was organized to preserve and protect the historical artifacts of Odessa and surrounding area, generally the Odessa R-7 School District, and to educate the general public on the heritage and history of the greater Odessa area, including the cities of Bates City and Mayview.

Donation of many items in the society's collection was made by the late Kay Sanders in the hope that a historical society for Odessa would be formed. Sanders' granddaughter, Laura sought the assistance of the community to form a board and establish a historical society in 2008. The result was the Odessa Area Historical Society.

Odessa Area Historical Society has opened a museum and headquarters at 203 South Second St. in downtown Odessa. The building was donated for use to the Society by the Bank of Odessa.

Officers are Dennis Slusher, president; Candace Osborne, vice president; Kay Robbins, secretary; Lenora Fieth, treasurer; Julia Cobb, executive secretary.

Activities of the society include archival of the collection as well as promoting the history of Odessa.





Odessa Community Service Center (OCSC) at 212 South Second Street is in the heart of downtown. In 1991, the center opened in response to needs and the transportation problems posed for families traveling to Lexington for services.

The center is open 9 a.m. - 12:15 p.m. Monday, Wednesday and Friday. Phone number is 230-7558. OCSC relies heavily on private donations from churches, schools and businesses and a generous community.

Additional sources of support and funding come from the Salvation Army Bell Ringing program where 85¢ of each dollar donated is returned to the community to provide utility assistance for families. Center coordinates with churches, businesses and the community on an annual Christmas Adoption program that provides Christmas gifts for children. School supplies for K-8th grades are collected prior to the beginning of the school year and at Thanksgiving, the center provides families with food to make a turkey dinner.

Center operates with an all-volunteer staff led by Craig Kidwell, executive director and Patty Kidwell, food distribution director. Officers are Shannon Quick, president, Linda Elliott, vice president, Sharon Petkoff, treasurer and Larry Hol, secretary.



American Legion Post 286 was founded in 1919 and named for Pvt. William "Roy" Douthit who died November 13, 1918, in France. Douthit, who served in Company A, of the 101st Infantry, was awarded the Purple Heart and the WWI Victory Medal. After World War II, the name was changed to the Douthit-Specker American Legion Post 286, also to honor Sgt. Joe Carl Specker, who served in the 48th Combat Engineer Battalion and was killed January 6, 1944, at Mt. Porchia, Italy. A ship was named for him in 1945. Both men are buried in Odessa Cemetery.



Puddle Jumper Days was named after a train called the "Puddle Jumper" which stopped in Odessa and other area towns.







With 414 students, the Wellington-Napoleon district has a 14:1 student-to-teacher ratio and contains students from Wellington and Napoleon as well as many rural students.

The school offers a preschool for ages 3-5 that was started in late 2014.

Sni Valley Fire Protection District Stations are located at 1600 S. Broadway, Oak Grove and 207 E. Market Street, Bates City.

The district boundaries are the Johnson County line on the south, Route F (Truman Road) on the north, an imaginary line extending north and south from the 33 mile marker of I-70 on the east, and another imaginary line extending north and south from the 25 mile marker on the west.

This area encompasses the cities of Bates City, Oak Grove and most of the rural unincorporated areas surrounding those cities. It is an area that includes 78 square miles of territory; 40 in Jackson County and 38 in Lafayette County.

Rural Odessans have an ample supply of water due to Public Water Supply District #1 of Lafayette County.

Jeanette Nickels serves as district manager and Vivian Garrett-Bumgarner is district clerk.

The district serves 3369 customers, including the towns of Wellington, Napoleon, Bates City and Lake Lafayette.

The district offers automatic bill payment for customers. If interested in this option, contact the office. The district now accepts debit and credit cards with a 3% convenience fee. There are no after-hours reconnections.

To help alleviate problems caused by electrical outages, the district has a generator at the main pump station and a portable generator which can be moved between pump stations, to allow it to be filling towers should widespread electrical outage occur.

The district is working with the city of Independence for a second master meter for the north side of the water district. This will bring additional water to the district and supply more water in needed areas.

Meter deposits are \$100 for renters and \$60 for owners. An engineer reviews applications once a month to determine whether existing lines will handle increased loads without decreasing the quality to customers. The application fee for submittal is \$2560. Areas not adjacent to existing water lines are covered under a separate policy.

Board members are Kevin Brown, Marvin Siefker, Donald Pemberton, Brad Drecktrah and Devin Lundquist.

Board meets at 6 p.m., the third Monday of each month at the district office, 210 South Third Street. Office phone number is 633-7125.

Services **West Central Electric**

A member-owned, not-for-profit cooperative, West Central Electric Cooperative, Inc., was formed in 1939 to bring electricity to the rural areas of west central Missouri.

WCE distributes power to rural members of Lafayette, Johnson, eastern Jackson and parts of Pettis and Cass counties. The company's headquarters are in Higginsville, Lafayette County, with a branch office in Oak Grove in eastern Jackson County.

Office hours are 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Monday-Friday. WCE may be contacted by phone at 800-491-3803 or 816-565-4942 or by mail at P.O. Box 452, Higginsville, 64037.

The Higginsville office is one mile north of I-70 on Highway 13. The Oak Grove office is one-half mile north of I-70 on Highway F.

WCE operates as a cooperative system, regulated by bylaws. When someone signs up for service, they become a member and are a part owner of the cooperative. A board of directors, elected from among the members, meets monthly. An annual meeting of the cooperative membership takes place each year in August.


